

Tribal Administration:

Ever since our Tribal Main Servers were hacked and certain programs were impacted severely. The Planning Office lost all its e-mail data up to March 21, 2019. None of the contract files were affected, but the personal computer used in the Planning Office got infected, so the office did not function as it should. Again last week the Planning Office computer again acted up, and getting access to contract data was not possible, so certain reports could not be completed as required. So far, the planning office is catching up with required reporting requirements.

Tribal Transit Services:

Community members are reminded that the Tribal Transit Services is under a Fixed Bus Route Service. This means that the Program has fixed locations that riders can go to, and catch a ride to town, hospital, Probation Office, Safeway and Thriftway, and Post Office.

The Harney County Dial-A-Ride has expanded its transit services, starting on Monday, June 4th. They have initiated their Fixed-Route Scheduling. Dial-A-Ride will be coming to the Reservation between the hours from 3:00 to 7:00 p.m. - Monday thru Fridays. They will be stopping at our two bus stops to pickup any Tribal members needing a ride to Burns and return back by 7:00 p.m. Dial-A-Ride will drop its charge of \$1.00 and the ride is now free.

The Transit Program will be posting in the Newsletter the Rules to follow when riding in our Tribal Transit Program. We are preventing the transporting of aluminum cans in our Transit Buses.

During the last three months, the Planning Office has been working with our

Regional Transit Manager in the re-contracting of the Special Transportation Fund (STF) which funds our Tribal Transit Program for the 10 years. The Tribe was advised that we will be getting a 40% Budget Cut for Fiscal Year 2020 and 2021. The Tribe just received its re-contract agreement and we are still funded at the 2019 funding amount of \$69,700.00 per 2020 and 2021 Fiscal Years.

The Tribe will again submit a Section 5310 Enhanced Mobility of Seniors/Individuals with Disabilities. The Tribe will go after \$90,460.00 to purchase a large van to haul disabled riders; support the mobility management by supporting the Transit Manager; and to provide preventive maintenance of the Transit Motor Pool. The Planning Office continues to work with the Regional Transit Manager to request an extension to plan and install two bus stops with fiber-glass sheets.

Finally, the Planning Office has been working to get an Statewide Transportation Improvement Fund – Transit Application submitted by May 1st. Funding for this new Transit Program is from employers paying employment taxes including Tribal employees working for the Tribe. Since this is a new Transit Program, new contract requirements have been put in place. This program will have an Tribal Elders Advisory Committee composed of three members. Each member must be over 60 years of age, reside in our service area, and represent the Tribal Elders segment, another person to represent persons with disabilities, other speaking minorities, and a representative from Transit Agency. The Advisory Committee has one opening for a Tribal Elder (over 60 years of age) to represent individuals with disabilities. If you are interested in being on this committee, please send or drop off, a written letter stating your interest. You can give to Kenny or the Administrative Assistant – Beverly.

Our contract application will entail the following: Update the Burns Paiute Coordinated Human Services Transportation Plan; seek an individual to provide administrative program support; develop route deviation to increase our service area and more work hours; provide for the vehicle match funds of the vehicle purchase under Section 5310 Program; develop a capital reserve fund; and develop a operations reserve fund. We are hoping the Planning Office submitted application in the amount of \$250,000.00 to cover half of calendar year 2019, and full year for 2020 and 2021, get approved. We have not heard any further from ODOT on this application. Our Transit Office was advised if we really wanted to, the Tribe could start with the new work statements on July 1st, 2019.

The Planner has attached a one-page break-down of the three ODOT programs that the Tribe is getting Transit funds for our small, rural transit program.

The Planning Office will hold a public meeting to discuss what other types of transit services could be offered.

Emergency Response:

On April 10th, 2019 @ 0900 a.m., Emergency Management Services responded to a telephone call that the Silvies River was flooding its bank at 30 Paiute Street. Upon inspection by the EM Coordinator, there was water overflowing in the homeowner's lot; and needed sandbags to stop the overflowing of river water. A call was sent out to Natural Resources, Tribal Fire, Tribal Maintenance, and other volunteers to assist in getting sandbags from the County Yard for filled sandbags. The first trip involved two Tribal pickups with 6 tribal staff. These sandbags were unloaded by the old sandbag line along the river. Another trip was made to secure more sandbags involving three pickups and 9 individuals. These extra sandbags was

enough to stop the overflowing of the Silvies River. We had to use the Law Enforcement Ranger to assist in moving the sandbags along the riverbank.

The Emergency Management Services would like to thank all of the Tribal Staff and volunteers that helped in stopping the flooding of three homes and Church with Social Hall.

Detroit Lake:

For the past 2 years the Detroit Lake has been very low, with the floating docks, just laying on the ground. This year, the lake is very full, with the boat docks floating. It was good to see a full lake.

Tribal Transit Services provides local transport for Elders, individuals with disabilities, and low-income individuals between the Reservation and the Cities of Burns and Hines. Both of these Cities have the medical facilities, post offices, grocery stores, utility companies, and other stores meeting the needs of the Burns Paiute community members. Services are provided from Monday thru Friday, from 7:30 am to 3:30 pm. The Transit Services is set-up on a fixed-route system, and will deviate from the route to meet the needs of Tribal Elders or disabled persons.



Position Overview

Maintenance assistant must be able to work independently and be responsible for ensuring that facilities are clean and in good operating condition. Maintenance Assistance will perform general maintenance and repair of the buildings, grounds and equipment.

Duties

- Repairs and maintains physical structures of tribal facilities, office buildings using hand tools and power tools.
- Supervise Maintenance workers
- Safety Committee Member Attendee
- Keeping work/logs for Fleet vehicles
- Replaces defective electrical switches, light bulbs and other fixtures inside and out. Assemble office furniture. Hang wall items.
- Installation and Maintenance of Heating and Air Conditioning.
- Unload surplus food trucks (1 x month)
- Occasional backhoe work
- Paint structures, and repairs woodwork with carpentry tools.
- Manholes; flush yearly
- Frozen water systems, supplies and parts

Position Summary: Under the supervision of the Health Services Director, the Community Health Nurse is an integral part of the Burns Paiute Tribe health program with primary emphasis in providing direct health care, prevention education, and maintaining quality health standards for the tribal community.

Duties and Responsibilities:

1. Assess patient care using reasoning and decision making skills. Communicate clearly with patients and other health care professionals using spoken and/or written words
2. Provide nursing care through home visits or at the health center on a daily basis
3. Promote health education/prevention by presenting to individuals or groups
4. Coordinates patient care with other health professionals
5. Analyze, interpret, and initiate patient medical data on the patient care component encounter form
6. Provide follow up on patient treatment, recovery, and doctors orders
7. Coordinate activities relating to the weekly tribal health clinic
8. Assists the medical provider during clinic times
9. Maintains the tribal immunization program
10. Operates the Resource Patient Management System (RPMS) to enter patient data
11. Prepares program reports and program documentation as needed or requested
12. Ability and the knowledge of the importance of maintaining **strict confidentiality of all records and information pertinent to the nature of the work.**
13. Must maintain strict confidentiality of medical information and adhere to HIPAA and Privacy Act requirements.
14. Knowledge of community and public service providers

16. Able to lift and bend when caring for patients in the office or on a home visit.





Seeking to impress others-A narcissist measures his/hers worth on how others view his/her own accomplishments. He seeks to impress others and brags about his intelligence, looks, or personal belongings. He/she enjoys getting awards, recognition, and photo opportunities. These make him/her feel accomplished or successful. Although he/she likes feeling special, he/she has a deep-seated feeling of inferiority, which he/she masks with self-appreciation.

Feeling insecure-Narcissistic people have a strong sense of insecurity but they are not aware of it. They instead project their insecurities about their own failures and inadequacies to other people by blaming them.

Fear of emotion-Being afraid to show any emotion because their sense of autonomy is challenged.

Hypersensitive to insults-People who are overly sensitive to criticism

Haughty body language-The person exudes arrogance and pride, walking around with nose up high, rolling his eyeballs on anyone who annoys him/her, or smirking at others. He/she may also dress to look rich, even when he is not







Oregon Tobacco Facts in Brief

Tobacco use affects all Oregonians. It is the leading cause of preventable disease and death in Oregon and across the country. Nationally, tobacco kills more people than alcohol, AIDS, car accidents, illegal drugs, murders and suicides — combined (1).



Oregon's Tobacco Prevention and Education Program (TPEP) uses a sustained, comprehensive approach to support tobacco prevention and cessation in every community.

For more than 20 years, TPEP's approach has contributed to improved tobacco-related health


outcomes in Oregon. Since the program began, cigarette consumption in Oregon — as measured by per capita cigarette sales — has declined by more than 55 percent (Figure 1). When TPEP program funding was nearly eliminated in 2003, the state lost ground, and tobacco consumption ticked slightly up.

Figure 2. Adult cigarette smoking, Oregon, 2010-2017





Cigarette smoking in Oregon has declined by nearly 22 percent since TPEP started. However, 17 percent of Oregon adults still smoke cigarettes (Figure 2).

Large disparities persist in those who use tobacco and have the highest burden of tobacco-related illness. Groups with high rates of smoking include Oregonians with low income (28 percent); less than a high school degree (31 percent); Oregon Health Plan members (27 percent); Native Americans and Alaska Natives (30 percent); and African Americans (26 percent) (5).

New products such as inhalant delivery systems, also known as e-cigarettes, are a public health challenge. Youth e-cigarette use has increased dramatically in recent years. E-cigarettes are now the most common tobacco product Oregon youth use (Figure 3). Strong evidence shows many youth who use e-cigarettes will go on to use combustible cigarettes (6).

Thank you for providing notification that the Burns Paiute Tribe has taken the actions necessary to participate in the Section 184 Indian Housing Loan Guarantee Program. The Resolution No. 2019-03 identifies the Tribe's interest in participating in the Section 184 Loan Program.

Accordingly, the Burns Paiute Tribe is approved to participate on reservation (tribal, allotted, fee restricted or fee simple land) as well as off reservation in the state of Oregon and all other states that have been deemed an operating area for the Section 184 Loan Program. Please see the attached map of the United States that shows operating areas for the 184 Loan Program.

The Section 184 loan is a mortgage that can be used to:

- Purchase an existing home
- Purchase and rehabilitate an existing home
- Rehabilitation of a home
- Refinance
- New construction (site built and/or manufacture/modular housing)

The loan process commences with an approved 184 Lender. The lender will provide specific details regarding interest rates, closing costs and other transaction details specific to the applicant's loan request.

The role of the tribe for on reservation loans include:

- Completing the land status and jurisdiction form (see attached). The purpose of the form is to verify the subject property is located on the reservation and confirm the land type (trust, allotted, fee or fee restricted)
- Approving and executing a mortgage lease for tribal trust land

Additional roles of the tribe (although not mandatory) can include:

- Homebuyer counseling
- Down payment assistance
- Environmental assessment
- Infrastructure (on and off site)

The Tribe is instrumental and a medium to the tribal community. Therefore, it is important that the tribe understand the Section 184 Program and how it can provide housing and homeownership opportunities to the tribal members, the tribal housing authority and/or the tribe. At your convenience, we would like to schedule a one-hour conference call to address details of the 184-loan program. On or about May 23, 2019, Harney County will submit a Request for Release of Funds (RROF) to the Oregon Business Development Department (OBDD) for the release of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 as amended, for its housing rehabilitation program. The purpose of Harney County’s housing rehabilitation program is to use it to perform repair and rehabilitation of existing single-family, owner-occupied units located in various locations in Harney County. Annually, the program rehabilitates over 20 low- to-moderate-income homes with approximately \$295,000.00 of CDBG funds.

Specific locations of individual units to be rehabilitated cannot be determined prior to the completion of the Area-Wide Environmental Review and the RROF. For the housing rehabilitation activities proposed Harney County is using a Tiered Environmental Review format and process proposed under HUD Regulations for the National Environmental Policy Act at 24 CFR Part 58.15.

In this first tier, a broad area-wide statutory review of the housing rehabilitation program has identified laws and authorities that we have determined will not be triggered by the location of the rehab program. These laws include: Floodplain Management (24 CFR Part 55 and Executive Order 11988), The Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972, the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act of 1968, The Clean Air Act, The Farmland Protection Policy Act of 1981, The Environmental Justice Executive Order 12898, and The Explosive and Flammable Operations Standard (24 CFR Part 51C), Wetland Protection (Executive Order 11990), Sole Source Aquifers (The Safe Drinking Water Act, 40 CFR Part 149), The Endangered Species Act (50 CFR Part 402), Airport Clear Zones and Accident Potential Zones (24 CFR Part 51D)

In the second tier review, Harney County identified laws and authorities that must be analyzed with site-specific environmental review checklists for each property location. These laws include: Historic Preservation (36 CFR Part 800), Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973, The Noise Abatement and Control Standard (24 CFR part 51B) and Toxic Chemicals and Radioactive Materials (24 CFR, Part 58.5(i)).

An Environmental Review Record (ERR) that documents the environmental determinations for this project, along with a copy of Burns/Hines/Harney County Residential Housing Rehabilitation Program policies and processes to be followed for site specific reviews, is on file, and may be examined or copied weekdays from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at: 450 North Buena Vista #5 in Burns, Oregon

PUBLIC COMMENTS: Any individual, group, or agency may submit written comments on the ERR to the Harney County Clerk/Recorder office. All comments received by May 22, 2019 will be considered by Harney County prior to submission of a request for release of funds.

OBJECTIONS TO RELEASE OF FUNDS: OBDD will accept an objections to its approval of the release of funds and the Harney County certification for a period of fifteen days following the anticipated submission date or actual receipt of the request for release of funds (whichever is later) only if they are on one of the following bases:

OBDD will accept objections to its Release of Funds only if they are based on one of the following:

- A. The certification was not executed by the Certifying Officer of Harney County.
- B. Harney County has omitted a step or failed to make a decision or finding required by HUD regulations at 24 CFR Part 58.
- C. Harney County has committed funds or incurred costs not authorized by 24 CFR Part 58 before approval of a release of funds by OBDD.
- D. Another federal agency acting pursuant to 40 CFR Part 1504 has submitted a written finding that the project is unsatisfactory from the standpoint of environmental quality.

Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58), and shall be addressed to OBDD at 775 Summer Street NE, Suite 200, Salem, OR, 97301-1280. Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by OBDD.



Required Qualifications: • Native American or tribally affiliated • 19—24 years old • High School Diploma, GED • Ability to lift 50 lbs, hike several miles, and be on feet for 8 to 10 hours per day • Positive mental attitude, flexibility and commitment to success • Excellent judgment • Ability to listen, give and take feedback, and learn constantly • Desire to go the extra mile to make a positive impact on oneself, others and the environment • Ability to pass a criminal history background check • Unemployed for one month prior to program start and qualifies for federal assistance (SNAP, TANF, OHP, etc)
